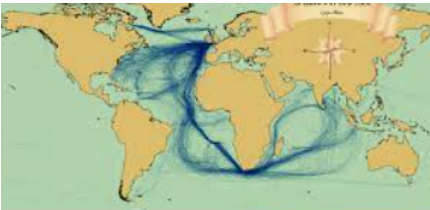
### Ordnance Survey (OS) Maps

Ordnance Survey is the national mapping agency for Great Britain. OS creates up to date and accurate maps depicting the landscape's human and physical features. All OS maps use the same symbols, which are included in a key so people using the map know what each symbol represents.

### Trade Routes in Victorian Britain



In the 19th Century, Britain was the most powerful trading nation in the world. Its manufactured goods were sold to every continent in the world. The navy blue on the map above shows some of the routes sailed to distribute the goods.



### Cotton

Due to the mass production of cotton, these new networks of trade developed. Raw cotton came from Egypt and the Southern states of America which was shipped to Liverpool and then spun and woven in Lancashire.

Word	Definition
<b>Ordnance Survey Map</b>	Ordnance Survey is the national mapping agency for Great Britain and this is how Ordnance Survey maps are created.
<b>4/6 figure grid references</b>	They are used to locate a particular grid square on a map. The numbers are given in eastings (read along) and northings (read up).
<b>Northings</b>	A figure or line representing the northward distance on a map.
<b>Eastings</b>	A figure or line representing the eastward distance on a map.
<b>Cities</b>	Any large town or populous place (in the UK this place must have a cathedral).
<b>Counties</b>	A county usually consists of several towns and the rural areas that surround them.
<b>Trade Route</b>	A long-distance route where commercial goods are transported.
<b>Human features</b>	Things that are made or built by humans. 
<b>Physical features</b>	Natural features on the earth's surface
